Dear Families,

Another action-packed week at Naunton Park! Children have started their visits to the Literature festival which they are very excited about. It is great to see that more learning is taking place outside the classroom. I am sure photographs of this will be in the following newsletters. As part of strengthening our communications between school and home you will start to see weekly messages from your child's class. As I have previously mentioned we will be moving to a different platform in the future.

Thank you to all parents for your patience in returning to virtual only parents' consultations this week. As ever, with using technology there may have been a few technical issues. Next term we aim to move to a hybrid approach, however this will be dependent of building works.

This week I completed my final talk with parents in the evenings. I will send a recorded message out next week for all families. Consultation papers for years 4/5/6 will follow shortly. It has been such a valuable experience being able to share my vision, the roadmap for the school and most importantly to answer questions posed at these evening sessions. Collating up to 420 consultation papers will take time but I will endeavour to achieve this over the next few weeks.

I have been in post for 25 days now and already so much has been achieved and much more is planned for. As the saying goes "Rome wasn't built in a day" I am acutely aware of the improvements required for the school and we are leading on these with a great sense of purpose. There must be a balance of how much we can achieve in a graduated approach so that new initiatives and changes to practice are embedded and sustained. There is a structured plan for reviewing several aspects of the school, much of which is underway. Communication of these reviews and outcomes will be shared with you as we move through the school year.

This week we welcomed Helen Tate, consultant for early years, to our school. This was an opportunity to celebrate the successes in Reception and our Early curriculum, and to reflect upon how we can further enhance provision and the Early curriculum. There are exciting plans afoot and we look forward to sharing them with you.

On the last Monday of term (18/10/22) we will be collecting all reading records in for the senior leadership team to review. Can you please make sure your children bring them in as they normally do.

Finally, this week saw the start of Black History Month. Through assembles and tasks for the children to complete at home we will be focusing on celebrating Black British people who have made a significant contribution to our society. As we start to develop our new curriculum this will be embedded throughout the year and highlighted every October. There is a good explanation of what Black History month is and why we celebrate it on Children's Newsround should you wish to share this at home.

Class News


In Blue Class, we have been generating our own version of The Three Billy Goats Gruff.

We have enjoyed retelling the story using puppets, painting and collaging images of the Gruffalo too.






