Dear Families,

Welcome to the first edition of Parklife this year. I have decided to move to a more traditional newsletter approach in which the children's work during the week is shared and celebrated. We have split the school in half so the teachers in each year group post pictures and a brief explanation every fortnight. As I have said previously, we are hoping to move to a platform called Seesaw to ensure improved communications between school and parents. Until then, we are starting to implement different approaches such as teachers sharing messages during the week and in the New Year we will start class assemblies where families will be invited in to see their child's class perform. (Buildings work permitting!) Parents will also be invited to join online meetings with their child's class teacher to learn about the class curriculums (information next week) and we will begin such things as open days and parent learning sessions.

This week we have welcomed our reception children who have been superb in settling in to school life. I have enjoyed reading stories to them and learning their names at drop off and pick up.

It has been an absolute pleasure to see the Just Reading project started across the school. It is such a wonderful way to start the day with a calm atmosphere around the school; children are engrossed in their new texts. Teaching partners have been super busy delivering the assessments which coincide with the project.

This week I have also seen some great examples of Talk for Writing across the school. At this stage in their learning the children are imitating a story which they learn off by heart following a story map. I was invited in to see the Y4 classes retell their story with great prosody and actions to match. Y2 were rehearsing and performing their story in the lower hall this week which looked like great fun! Following on from this, the children will then innovate the story making specific changes and then finally they will complete the invention stage where they keep to the same genre but create their own stories. We are very lucky to have a series of training and CPD session with Pie Corbett – he will be leading a staff meeting next week, INSET in October and another Twilight session in November. My aspiration is for Naunton Park to become an accredited Talk for Writing school – The teachers have made a great start!

I have sent out dates for Welcome and Consultation meetings - I will either record or send out notes on this for those who cannot attend. Once I have competed these talks, I will send out consultation questionnaires. At the moment I am gathering consultaions from all the team. You will also soon receive information about Curriculum Information Meetings (online) with class teachers and our Autumn Term Parent/Teaching Consultations.

Thank you for making me feel really welcome over the last two weeks, it really is a privilege to be Headteacher at Naunton Park and I am thoroughly enjoying it.






'How our day begins in year 4 - Wye. Spellings practice and reading our fantastic story, The Night Bus Hero as part of the Just Reading Project.'
