


In RE week, we have been thinking answering the question: Why does Easter matter to Christians?

## Mrs Walls and Miss. Wright

In Red Class, we have been thinking about what God means to Christians and about the Easter Story. We have talked about why Easter is such an important time of year for Christians and how it can be celebrated. We have also explored the season of Spring, thinking about the signs of new life that we can see around us. Many of us enjoyed looking closely at and then drawing daffodils with wax crayons or oil pastels and we were very proud of our pictures.

During RE week we learnt about how Muslims wish to do a pilgrimage to Makkah once in their lifetime – this is called the Hajj. Firstly, we went to Makkah and visited the Ka'ba - the most important site to Muslims. When we were there, we walked around the Ka'ba seven times in an anticlockwise direction while thinking about our love for Allah. Next we ran seven times between the hills of Safa and Marwah. Following that we visited the Plain of Arafat. Here we prayed to Allah for forgiveness of our bad deeds and cleansed ourselves. Then, before returning to Makkah, we collected pebbles at Muzdalifah before setting off once again for the holy city. On the way to Makkah we stopped at the Pillars of Jamarat to throw our pebbles at the pillars casting out evil. Now we were ready to return to Makkah and once more walk around the Ka'ba seven times before our pilgrimage was over.

As part of RE week and to help year six answer the question: 'What do Christians think Jesus did to save them?' we visited Emmanuel church to learn all about holy communion. Sarah, the vicar, explained to the children what happens during this at her church and why. She also answered lots of the fabulous questions the children had, which there were lots of!

Here are some of the things we found out:

"Communion is a celebration of Jesus Christ where Christians remember the last supper."

"Maundy Thursday - the Thursday before Easter - was the last feast with Jesus and his disciples where he stated that the bread represents his flesh and the wine his blood."

"Children sometimes drink grape juice instead of red wine."

"As the bread and wine is blessed, the vicar will consume what is left over so not to waste any. They therefore have to be very careful about the amount that they prepare!"

# Vacancy

## Kids' Club Play Worker

The Governors are looking to appoint an enthusiastic and motivated Play Worker to join Kids' Club, our school's hard working and dedicated wrap-around care team. The role and expectations for this post are outlined in the job description and job specification (both available on request or from the school's website).

The school has up to 420 children on roll. Kids' Club is a very popular provision amongst children and their parents. It's a fun, lively and sociable atmosphere, which both children and staff enjoy. The role of a Kids' Club Play Worker is very much valued by the whole school community. Free childcare at Kids' Club is available for any Play Worker whose child/ren attend Naunton Park Primary School.

The ultimate responsibility of a Play Worker is to ensure children have a meaningful, happy and safe time to play after school in a stimulating play environment. Our team of Play Workers actively support the children in their play and provide engaging and varied opportunities for them to enjoy before and/or after the end of the school day.

During our after-school sessions, Play Workers work together to set up indoor and outdoor activities; prepare snacks for the children; register children in/out; facilitate games and activities; and, support children in their play.

There are two posts available:

- 1) Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday
  - 3:00pm 5:15pm (9 hours per week)
  - Grade 2
- 2) Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday
  - 3:00pm 5:15pm (6 hours 45 minutes per week)
  - Grade 2

If you are interested in either of the posts but are unable to work the exact hours as written above, please still apply and let us know, on the application form, your availability to fulfil the role.

The closing date for applications is 9am, Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> February. Shortlisting and interviews will take place during the week following shortlisting. The start date(s) is ASAP.

Our school is committed to safeguarding and promoting the well-being of all children and expects our staff, volunteers and parents to share this commitment. Our Child Protection Policy can be found here: <a href="Naunton Park Primary School-Policies">Naunton Park Primary School-Policies</a> It is an offence to apply for this role if you are barred from engaging in regulated activity relevant to children. Appointments are made subject to an enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service check as well as employment checks including the Right to Work Check. As part of our due diligence within safer recruitment, school will be carrying out online searches to help identify any incidents or issues which may need to be explored at interview. Additionally, any gaps or anomalies that arise during the application stage of the recruitment process will be explored further at interview. Shortlisted candidates will be asked additional questions about safeguarding during the interview process. We promote diversity and want a workforce which reflects the population of Gloucestershire.

The amendments to the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 (Exceptions) Order 1975 (2013 and 2020) provides that when applying for certain jobs and activities, certain convictions and cautions are considered 'protected'. This means that they do not need to be disclosed to employers, and if they are disclosed, employers cannot take them into account. Guidance about whether a conviction or caution should be disclosed can be found on the Ministry of Justice website.

# Safeguarding

Safeguarding is our absolute priority at Naunton Park and we are always looking for ways to develop our culture of safeguarding in school and throughout the school community. We have a very child-centred approach to safeguarding. To this end, each term we will be providing a "safeguarding" update in Park Life, so that parents and carers become more aware of how we ensure your child is safe in school but also to increase your awareness about how we support the children with their knowledge and understanding of 'safeguarding' and how we teach children about keeping themselves safe and healthy now and for the future. This is our first update for Park Life and one that we hope you'll find useful.

## Safeguarding responsibilities

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility – staff, pupils, parents/carers and all members of the school community – to keep our children safe and happy.









The school's Designated Safeguarding Leads ("DSLs") are: Miss Hudson, Mrs Fletcher, Mrs Turner and Mrs Gray. The responsibilities for these members of staff are to provide further support to staff, parents and pupils as a result of higher-level training that they have completed. School staff often seek support and advice from Gloucestershire Safeguarding Children Executive and work closely with other professionals so that help is timely and useful to all.

### **School volunteers**

We are always incredibly appreciative of support from parents and friends of the school and really do value the time you give to helping in school and on trips. Thank you for your continued understanding about the information and documents we require to enable you to volunteer with us. Anytime someone comes into school who may not be supervised at all times MUST come to school with photographic ID. Likewise, anyone who provides 'regular' support (usually 3+ times per month) are required to undergo a DBS Check. ## Safeguarding curriculum

We are in the process of reviewing how safeguarding is integrated in our curriculum. By this, we mean how we teach the children about safeguarding, including social, emotional and mental health matters, for example: how we can be physically and mentally healthy; how we keep ourselves safe both in and out of school; how we can keep others are safe and look after one another; how we keep ourselves safe online; how we practice and promote the school's rules and values; who to go to if we need help or have a worry about something; and, what to do if we feel unsafe in or out of school. Once we have collated all aspects of how our curriculum supports and teaches about safeguarding, we will then review the needs of our children and add to/adapt our curriculum so that our children's needs are fully met. This is particularly needed as technology moves on and children's access to different online services and APPs increases. We will publish our Safeguarding Curriculum on the school's website and put a link in Park Life once we have collated the information, which will then be updated as practice in school develops. We continue to work with other agencies to provide support directly to our children, including through NSPCC, Gloucestershire Healthy Living and Learning (GHLL), School Beat and GCC.
