#### Dear Families,

We have had a great start to term following our Easter break and our children are excited about the new pieces of learning. This term the children's learning will be heavily focusing on History, from how our homes have changed, explorers from the past, Ancient Egyptians, Ancient Greeks, Anglo-Saxons and Vikings and our Y6 children will be conducting their learning based on how Bath Road has changed over the year. We have a local Historian who has helped the Y6 teachers to plan this piece of learning and we are very excited to see what the children produce for his website! The teachers are also excited about this piece of learning and what the children will achieve, they fed this back to me during staff meeting on Tuesday.

#### STRIKE ACTION – Thursday 27th April, Tuesday 2nd May. NEU Message to Parents

In July, the Government offered most teachers a pay rise of just 5 per cent – with inflation soaring, that adds up to a 7 per cent pay cut. The 5 per cent offered isn't fully funded – that means Government expects your school to pay for it out of its already dwindling budget. Because our pay is not keeping up with the cost of living, teachers and support staff are leaving for jobs with comparable salaries but without the stress and workload generated by targets and paperwork that exist in schools right now.

One in three teachers leave education within five years. And last September, almost a third fewer trainees began teacher training than are needed. Schools have too many vacancies. Heads tell us of vital subjects – maths, science, computing, languages – with unfilled posts and existing staff delivering lessons outside their subject every single day. Managing with fewer staff also means we can't give enough personal support if your children need extra help. And it means they have reduced access to sports, drama, music and other activities that make the week for a lot of pupils. We don't want to be on strike.

We'd rather be in the classroom, getting on with what we do best – teaching and supporting your children. But we can't stand by and see our colleagues experience hardship with yet another real-terms pay cut. And we can't stand back and watch the exodus from teaching and the resulting decline in the quality of education for your children. Our action for a fully funded, above-inflation pay rise isn't just about making sure that teachers and support staff make ends meet. It's about the future of education. This Government is failing children and young people and those who teach and support them. And, like our NHS staff, we are being forced into taking action for our members, our pupils and their future.

#### Anti-Bullying Education in School

On Monday 24<sup>th</sup> April Mrs Bradshaw will be leading on our new Anti-Bullying approaches and practices. The children will learn about **STOP**:

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In assembly, Mrs Bradshaw will introduce STOP to the children as a way of determining the difference between someone being unkind and someone who is bullying through targeting behaviour. They will also learn about **ACT** Ask the bully to stop Collect a friend or witness Tell an adult.

# **Class News**

In Year 6 this week, we have started looking at our new leading question: How has Bath Road changed over time?

We began by thinking about how settlements began as small farms or villages; what natural resources made it a good place to live; and how they expanded.

We also looked at old maps and photographs of Cheltenham to see how it had developed.



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Thames had lots of fun during their Severn Trent workshop on Tuesday. They were asked to think of all the possible items that might go down our toilets or drains, they enjoyed listing 'poo', 'wee' and vomit the most (!), before moving on to cleaning products, food waste, toilet roll, wipes and so on. Rob added each of these items to a pretend pipe with water in it and mashed it up to show us what it looks like all mixed together in the pipes. Rob's homemade weetabix and chocolate poo received lots of 'eww's and disgusted faces!

Following this, each group was challenged to clean some of the water using a range of tools seen in the photographs. We learned how this water gets cleaned through a variety of processes before making it's way back to our taps. We discussed all the things we could do to improve the cleanliness of our water and to prevent drain blockages and water pollution.

Our top tips are:

Leave oil overnight to solidify before disposing into the food bin rather than pouring down the drain. Scrape sauces into the foodbin rather than rinsing under the tap.

Only wipes showing this logo, should be flushed down the toilets. Others will take around 150 years to



break down.

Later in the day, some of Thames volunteered to help during Rob's assembly. Enjoy their dressing up outfits!! Ask your children if they can remember what a 'fatberg' is and how big was the biggest one ever found?






Green and Red classrooms are being transformed to enable the children to access the resources they need. Parts of the room are zoned too, supporting different areas of the curriculum.

In Cherwell this week, we have been working hard at learning to tell the time on the analogue clock. We are doing really well with this - watch out for people telling you what time it is at the weekend. Soon, we will move on to telling the time on a digital clock.

We have also been enjoying our new history topic on Ancient Egypt and thinking about our new Leading Question: What Makes a Great Civilisation? We have created a timeline to show when Ancient Egyptian people lived and we have started to understand that this civilisation lasted for a very long time. We have some lovely new books on Ancient Egypt in our classroom.



This week in Year 2 the children have been learning all about money. They have been looking at different coins and notes and combining them to make different amounts. Using their place value and times tables knowledge they have been able to make connections in order to add different amounts. There has been lots of opportunities to handle money in class and for everyone to show their jottings on whiteboards.

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In Orange class, for an independent task linked to our English theme, the children made stick puppets based on the story of 'The Three Little Pigs'. They loved collaborating and narrating their own play, which we all enjoyed.
