It has been a short week but still lots of learning has been taking place in the classrooms. I had the pleasure of joining Y2 whilst Mrs Derrick taught a fab lesson on Captain Cook and his Voyages from the past. The children were absolutely enthralled by the lesson which included a top-secret letter; excellent learning at its best! The History pieces of learning have been very well received - our children are displaying a love of learning about the past and a thirst for knowledge and enquiry-based learning.

Exciting Plans for Playground Renovations

A great deal of my focus over the last 8 months has been on the Back on Track Model, introducing our Challenge Curriculum and investing in training and professional development for the teachers. This has all been necessary to ensure we are providing a great education for our children. As a school, we have made good progress against the School Improvement Plan and we continue to develop our teaching and learning practices term by term.

The school will continue with the buildings project, renovating every classroom over the next year. Works begin again in the summer holidays. Our new Site Manager is completing a lot of repair work and has plans for some bigger projects after the summer holidays – like the renovation of the Blue Stand in the playground, which definitely needs some TLC.

Before Easter, I asked a company to provide some quotes for Reception Classes' outdoor provision, to have fake grass across a large percentage of the playground so children can play differently than on the concrete, and to extend Forest School. As I suspected, the plans looked awesome but the cost was approximately £60 000. I need to take this quote to governors and our PTA and hopefully plan one of Nauntun Park's biggest fundraisers yet! The school has money ringfenced for early play and sports – approximately £15 000. So, together we need to raise the rest ourselves. I believe we can – it may take a few years and we may complete stages a year at a time - but we can do this. **TOGETHER WE CAN!**





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'This week in Year 4 we have been building up to writing our own 'defeat the monster' story based on the myth Theseus and the Minotaur. As part of this, children have been coming up with some fantastic descriptions of their own mythical creatures using fantastic adjectives, similes, alliteration and personification.'

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In Blue Class, we have been learning all about setting descriptions, in particular, the features that you would expect to see in a really well-written one.

1. Say what things are like **using adverbs and our senses**
2. Paint a picture using **adjectives**
3. Say where things are **using prepositions**
4. Use a list of three (The huge tree had a **tall trunk, green leaves** and **bright, yellow flowers**.)

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We have been building up our skills by looking at individual features during the week in preparation for writing a setting description of our own.

The children have been incredibly engaged in the learning process and have given super ideas, which the whole class have been able to access through our Talk 4 Writing washing line.

I'm really impressed by the developing use of powerful adjectives, prepositions and adverbs the children are using. This is really helping them to create powerful, descriptive sentences. Well done, Blue Class!




In Yellow Class, we have started looking at our new leading question for this term 'How have our homes changed over time?'. As it is a history based topic, we have been looking at some of the subject specific words we will be using by identifying whether we have never heard of this word before, we have heard of it but don't know what it means or we have heard of it and can tell you what it means. This has led to some very interesting discussions! We have also been looking at what our own houses are like and finding out how old they are. Here is the beginning of our class houses timeline.

This week year six visited The Bath Road to fill in a map to show what the different shops were along The Bath Road. We then used this data to create pie charts back at school and were surprised to find out just how many eating places and charity shops there were along one road!

We were also visited by Stuart Manton, a local historian, who showed us his website about Cheltenham South town and we will now start to investigate what each of the shops were in the past

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in order to find out how people's shopping habits have changed over time. This is really exciting as some of our work may be used to update his website!

Finally, we plan to interview local residents who have lived in this area for some time and can tell us about their memories of The Bath Road. The children designed some leaflets and we have posted these through the doors of local residents explaining more about our project.
