# **School News**

### **New Reading Books for KS2**

Over the past few months we have been auditing the Key Stage 2 levelled reading books. This auditing has involved bringing the books from individual class libraries into the main KS2 library; sorting, labelling and assessing; and discarding the old and out-of-date.

After significant investment, we have purchased more than 1,000 new books which have re-invigorated our KS2 reading scheme. Now we are thrilled to let you know that, following this process, the new books are ready to be enjoyed by the children. After much research and discussion, we have streamlined our KS2 reading books and purchased books exclusively from one scheme, Oxford University Press (OUP). This will now allow children to follow their reading journey seamlessly from KS1 through KS2.

As part of our normal assessment process, each child has a Reading Fluency Age and a Reading Comprehension Age (they are reassessed throughout the year as part of our normal assessment policy). Using their Reading Comprehension Age, class teachers have matched each child with their OUP Reading Level. It is important to stress that this level is a 'stage' and not an 'age' as children develop fluency and comprehension skills at different rates. Where a child is reading above Level 18 with a Comprehension Age of 11 years +, we consider that they are full 'free readers' and will not be coming home with an OUP reader. Children will read their way through each level and move to the next level when teachers assess that their vocabulary, fluency and comprehension skills are ready for the next stage. This is not about racing through a scheme but developing strong reading skills, including developing a wider vocabulary which will help with spellings.

As part of this KS2 Reading overhaul, we have also started to audit the KS2 class fiction libraries with lots of wonderful new books (fiction, non-fiction and graphic novels, on request!) being added to each class's book shelves. These will eventually be known as the 'Richer Read' books as they are there to develop in your children a love of reading and reading for pleasure. In the months to come, we hope to ensure that each child will bring home a 'Richer Read' book as well as their OUP levelled book. (Obviously those 'free' readers will just bring home the 'Richer Read' books.) The point of this, following in step with KS1, is that children will choose this book (rather than teachers ascribing a certain level) and it will be purely a reading for pleasure text. Please ensure that your child's OUP book is the reading priority as this is there to ensure progression with vocabular acquisition and comprehension skills.

The intention is that the 'richer read' book should be read with an adult or a more-accomplished reader who can model reading fluency; discuss vocabulary; and ask relevant comprehension questions. Obviously, the OUP books should also be read with an adult but the children should be 'leading' the reading with these books.

So, what does this mean to you as parents and carers? In the coming weeks you may start to notice that your child/children begin to bring home lovely new levelled books that we hope they will cherish and enjoy. Please ensure that your child continues to use their Reading Diary on a daily basis to note what they are reading and when this is happening. These diaries should still be brought into school every Monday morning to be looked at by class teachers. Reading Diaries are still only for home reading and reading in school time should not be recorded.

If you are concerned that your child's OUP reading book is not being changed frequently enough, please encourage re-reading of the book. Research shows that re-reading a known book will improve a child's overall fluency and comprehension as, once the higher-order brain skills of decoding words and grammar have been accomplished, the arguably more enjoyable task of reading for sense and understanding begins to come to the forefront. Therefore, we encourage re-reading as part of our fluency teaching. If you have any questions regarding the frequency of changing reading books, please ask your class teacher. If you have any other questions about the new system, please don't hesitate to see your class teacher or Mrs Morrish (from the English Team), who will be happy to discuss this further.

#### Year 6 PSHE

This term's PSHE in Year 6 is all about Relationships - with particular emphasis on our Mental Health. We have been thinking about what Mental Health actually means and writing definitions of this phrase and what it means to us.

We have also thought about the mental challenges children can face in life and we have been working on ideas to support children through these challenges. Our examples of supporting ideas included: talking to someone; enjoying time with family and friends; and doing something we enjoy to calm ourselves down.

This week we played the 'Relationships Web' game. Standing in a circle and using string to form connections, we each had to make a link to someone else in the class (eg 'I am choosing X because we are in the same House') and then pass the ball of string to them whilst still holding on to the string – sounds more complicated than it was! After we did this we discussed the question: 'What was the point of this game?'

These are some of our answers:

"It was to show how everyone is connected in some way."

"By doing this we made everyone feel included."

"We worked together to make everyone feel part of the game."





This week in year 3 we had a very exciting visitor – an expert in Ancient Egypt came to spend the whole day with us, complete with a trunk of artefacts and cleverly made props to help make us feel we were in Ancient Egypt for the day. We learnt how mummies were made – with one volunteer bravely daring to put their hand inside the body and another kindly putting the 'organs' into Canopic jars.



Being Egyptologists for the day, we learnt about different Egyptian Gods and Pharaohs and learnt how archaeologists piece their ideas together from the evidence and artefacts left behind.

A good day was had by all.



Stella and her three fellow explorers trek across the snowy Icelands and come face-to-face with frost fairies, snow queens, outlaw hideouts, unicorns, pygmy dinosaurs and carnivorous cabbages . . . As part of our daily whole class reading sessions we are trying to read a chapter a day and are determined to finish this text before the end of term!



Our challenge curriculum has literature at the heart of it so each term we have a super selection of quality texts designed to spark the children's interest and to enhance their knowledge. Over the last couple of weeks in Yellow Class we have thoroughly enjoyed exploring and discussing these two books to support our leading question 'How have our homes changed over time?'









We are continuing to enjoy the story of The Pig in the Pond. Red Class had so much fun creating their King Charles pictures last week by cutting and joining different shapes and colours that we have created pig pictures this week! Some of us chose to make our pig using one colour and some of us chose to use different shades of pink. Some of us made the tails flat and some of us made curly tails. Every pig is different and we are very proud of our creations.



This week, Year 5 had an exciting visit from a Viking warrior! He told them all sorts of tales about the weaponry, travel and battles with the children asking all sorts of interesting questions.
