PRIME MINISTER



nce upon a time a boy called Winston was given some soldiers and that sparked his imagination.

Many years later, he joined the army and fought in WW1. 21 years after he saw the start of WW2 and finally became Prime Minister of Great Britain on May 10<sup>th</sup> 1940. Joseph Stalin and Franklin Roosevelt teamed up with Winston to fight Hitler, Mussolini and Hirohito. He kept the British spirit alive with his motivating speeches and words. Even through the Blitz he uttered the famous words "We shall fight on the beaches, the landing grounds, the fields, streets and the hills, we will never surrender".


His biggest challenge was the Battle of Britain. Over 3000 British men contributed and Churchill called them The Few. 23,002 people were killed and 2500 of which were German. 1800 German planes were lost and many more damaged. He addressed the British Nation on the wireless and said Never in the field of human conflict owed so much by so much to so few. Winston Churchill was a British legend and took our people from the brink of defeat to victory by using the power of words and their meaning. He will always be remembered as the British Bulldog.

### Year 6 - Windrush


We are continuing to explore our leading question: Who helped Britain win the war? This week we have been learning about Winston Churchill and the important role he played in this. After carrying out their own research, each child drafted, edited and then published a short biography about him in the style of the 'Goodnight Stories for Rebel Boys' books . Here is an example of a finished piece by Sadie in Windrush.



During our Maths On Track sessions in Orange Class, we have been using a great new resource called a Rekenrek. Using this piece of equipment, we have been developing our ability to identify a number without counting which is called 'subitising'. We have learnt how to put the beads into the 'ready' position by having all the beads on one side by the white dot and then using one push movement to separate a given number. As we know that each group is 5, we have been able to notice that, for example, 3 needs 2 more to make 5. 4 needs 1 more to make 5. 5 needs 0 more to make 5. We've also practiced getting them out and putting them back VERY carefully to keep them all safe which we know is very important. We have done so well this week!



Year 2 are really enjoying their Just Reading text this term, 'Guardians of Magic' by Chris Riddell. The story follows the magical journey of 3 Guardians of magic: Zam, Phoebe and Bathsheba, three children who don't know how powerful they are... Purple Class are enjoying sharing the text and predicting what might happen as each chapter unfolds.







## Thames Class news

This week, in year 4, we have learned about Mayan architecture. We found it fascinating how advanced their architecture was. They designed and built layered temples that could withstand earthquakes and other natural disasters, by absorbing shock waves.

We then carefully sketched either the Temple at the city of Tikal or El Castillo temple in Chichen Itza. We used different lines and marks to show texture and shadows on our buildings.

Year 5 had an amazing day yesterday with Luke from Past Productions. They had the chance to study Roman artefacts, try on reproduction armour and put on plays which taught them about different areas of Roman life, crime and punishment.
