We have a had a great start to the new term with lots of RE learning taking place this week. I have had the pleasure of teaching in a couple of classes this week and the children's knowledge and understanding of the topics they are learning of great. Next week we move onto our next piece of learning Step Back in Time: with a strong history and geography focus.

Class News

Class – Thames

This week in RE week, we have been answering the question 'For Christians, what impact did Pentecost have after Jesus left?'. The children have loved looking at a range of artwork showing Pentecost and discussing the different styles but also the similiar aspects such as flames, disciples and the dove, representing the Holy Spirit. Today, we were visited by Mrs Tennant-Michael, a former teaching partner at Naunton Park, as she shared her faith with us and told us more about the Kingdom of God. The children asked fascinating questions such as 'Is the Kingdom of God heaven?' and 'What do Christians imagine the Kingdom of God to look like?"

Class – Orange

This week has been RE Week and our leading question has been 'Who is Jewish and how do they live?' We have learnt about Shabbat and how Jewish people prepare for Shabbat, listened to stories that are important to Jewish people, for example, the story of David and Goliath and learnt about the Jewish Festival of Light, Hanukkah. We made our own mezuzah's which are displayed outside our classroom door and created collages of menorah candles. Some of us chose to create one using a given picture and some of us created our own completely. Each one is unique and they are all wonderful! You might like to ask us why there are 9 candles! On Wednesday, we were lucky enough to have a Zoom call with Jenny from the Cheltenham Synagogue who was able to answer lots of our questions. We have certainly learnt a lot this week!







Class - Purple

As part of RE Week, Year 2 had a visit from Sarah from Emmanuel Church. As part of our learning the children were exploring how to answer the question "Why does Easter matter to Christians?". They have learnt all about the Easter Story and the many events that happen in this Holy Week. Sarah told us a lot more about the Easter Story and even got some of the children to demonstrate the importance of how Jesus is almost like a bridge between God and humans.





Class - Cherwell

In Cherwell class this week, we have been busy learning the time on analogue clocks. We have also been being very creative with our poetry composition and have enjoyed sharing our poems with the class, practising our skills of oration and performance. It has been very impressive! Class – FROME & SEVERN

Year 5 have had a great start back to school this week and have been immersed in the study of two comparative religions – Islam and Judaism. It has been fascinating to compare the two religions and to make connections while thinking about our two Leading Questions: What does it mean to be a Muslim in Britain today? And, Why is the Torah important to Jewish People?

One of the highlights of the week has been recreating the Hajj in our very own playground! It rained. We had to suspend our disbelief.

The Hajj is a pilgrimage that Muslims try to take to Makkah once in their life time, it is one of the 5 Pillars of Islam – please ask your child to explain!

- 1. Firstly, we went to Makkah and visited the Ka'ba; we walked around the Ka'ba seven times in an anticlockwise direction.
- 2. Next we ran seven times between the hills of Safa and Marwah.
- 3. We then drank from the well of Zamzam.
- 4. Following that we visited the Plain of Arafat.
- 5. Then we collected seven pebbles at Muzdalifah. We stopped at the Pillars of Jamarat to throw our pebbles at the pillars casting out evil. We finally returned to Makkah and again walked seven times around the Ka'ba.

Year 6

RE Week

As part of our RE week, we were answering the question: What do Christians believe Jesus did to save people? After hearing the Easter story and finding out about the last supper, we visited Emmanuel church where Sarah, the vicar, told us more about Communion. These are some of the facts we found out:

- Communion derives from the Last Supper where Jesus broke bread into pieces and told his
 disciples to remember him whenever they ate it. He also told them to remember his blood
 when they drank red wine
- Different wine can be drunk e.g. alcoholic, non-alcoholic or grape juice
- Communion can happen anywhere at any time though it does often happen on a Sunday at church
- Anybody can take communion in certain churches. Emmanuel church is very welcoming and will allow anyone to take part in communion
- Communion can be taken to people who can't get to church e.g. if they are very ill. This is
 often a huge comfort
- Communion can have different names e.g. Communion, Mass, Eucharist...
- It can be taken at different places within a church building e.g. the altar or at a communion table which is usually positioned nearer the congregation at the front of the church
- Bread can be in wafer form or an actual loaf of bread
- In some churches, only the vicar can serve communion, but in other denominations, anyone
- Wine is traditionally taken from the common silver cup which is wiped with a cloth every time someone has had a drink
- Communion makes the 'church' rather than the building itself







Safeguarding

How do children stay safe in school?

Safe Adults

Our rigorous recruitment processes & checks when visitors arrive at reception ensure that only safe adults are in school.

Visitors are reminded to ONLY enter via the office & must wear the appropriate lanyard that has been given to them by our office staff.

Lunch Clubs

Children who find it tricky to manage time on the large playground & unstructured playtimes often spend their lunchtimes in the Woodland Room, Forest School area or YR outdoor classroom. They eat their lunch, play with friends and talk to adults. These spaces always have a lovely buzz!

Clear procedures

You can see in our Visitors'
Leaflet what our procedures
are if we think that a child
needs further support or
school needs support from
other professionals. These
are also displayed around the
school and are explained in
our Child Protection Policy on
the school's website.

Supervision

Children are supervised at all times other than when visiting the toilet (unless other arrangements are made). When using the toilet, children wear a yellow band so that the adults know where they are going & only two children can be out of the classroom at a time. YR take this responsibility very seriously 🚳

School trips

We use GCC's system to Risk Assess school trips and always have a designated adult to effectively plan these in advance. We ensure that we have the correct supervision ratios needed to safely support the children, which varies for each year group and class, and make sure we have all contact numbers in case needed.

School Rules

The children are excellent at explaining how our school rules keep themselves & others safe. Please ask your child to tell you about them & how all three keep them safe...

Pastoral support
